MY CATHOLIC FAITH

THE GLORIOUS RESURRECTION

~FROM THE PASTOR~

Today we celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord. Our long period of penance and preparation is over and we can now partake in the great Feast! We must never forget however, that there would have been no Resurrection if it hadn't been for the Cross. This is why I am including some quotes about the Cross from some of our greatest saints. Also, when the wrappings were found in the empty tomb, there was a separate cloth for our Lord's head/face folded and placed separately from His shroud. We will learn a bit more about this amazing relic.

~THE RESURRECTION~

"We are so accustomed to hearing of Jesus risen from the dead that we could say, "Oh yea...we know all about it" and miss the grace of this holy season of Easter. But think about it, Jesus rose from the dead! Death is not the end. It is only the door to beyond. Let us not allow the resurrection of Jesus to have to fight for room in our lives; let Jesus' death and resurrection be the center of our lives. We had been waiting for this moment for thousands of years. The Old Testament shows us that history was working out God's plan but the highpoint in God's plan for us was the resurrection. Easter is the greatest celebration of the Church. Jesus' Resurrection

reminds us that there is life beyond the grave. Jesus' resurrection reminds us that there is more to each of us than meets the eye, that we have an immortal soul. Although our body will return to dust, our soul will live forever with God. What is the purpose of life? What is your goal in life? Where is your heart in life? Life has only one ultimate goal, to prepare for the next life, and if you are not preparing for your own resurrection you are like a train that has become derailed. What happens to a train that gets derailed? It goes nowhere. Can you take your house to heaven with you? Then why make such a fuss about your house? Can you take your car to heaven with you? Well then, why become so engrossed in your car? Can you take your bank account to heaven with you? Use your money for the spread of the Gospel. Why are you so busy that you have no time to pray to God every day? It is God you want to meet in the next life, isn't it? I cannot understand anyone who says they believe in God but does not pray every day. It is a contradiction to say that you believe in God but do not pray."

~PRAY, PRAY, PRAY~

"Just think of it, you will be transformed to become glorious like Jesus. Do you live like someone who believes in such a glorious future? If you do, surely everything in this world takes on a new perspective,

so that, as I said earlier, we do not become possessed by our possessions. And since you will be transfigured, will be glorious like the risen Jesus, why do you not pray for a substantial amount of time every day? Do you see why I say it is a contradiction to say that you believe in God if you don't pray? The reason we have so many problems is because we don't pray enough. Pray, pray, pray. THE FACE CLOTH OF CHRIST

~THE SUDARIUM~

The Sudarium is sometimes called the other Shroud, or more correctly the face-cloth of Christ. Scientists believe it was put over the head of a corpse as part of a Jewish custom when the death was awful so that the family would not see the face going into rigor mortis. The Sudarium is referred to in John 20:5-8. It was placed over Jesus' face on his way to the tomb so that his mother especially would be spared more anguish. Unlike the Turin Shroud which has an image of a crucified man, there is no image on the Sudarium. It contains stains of blood and lymph. The linen of the Shroud is a fine herringbone weave but the Sudarium is rough weave and looks like muslin. Very few people even in Spain knew of the Sudarium until recently. It was only when Msgr. Ricci, who was studying the Shroud, went through church archives and discovered that there was another cloth which had been in Oviedo since the 800's. Msgr. Ricci decided it had to be tested because if it had similarities with the Shroud it would be important corroborating evidence. That was 1969. With the coming into being of the Spanish Society for the Study of the Sudarium in 1987 it became popularly known. Before that it was known only by very few. Now the Sudarium is preserved in the Camara Santa (special chapel built for the Sudarium) of the Cathedral in Oviedo, Spain.

~SCIENCE SPEAKS~

This Sudarium speaks to unbelieving scientific men. The markings on the Sudarium show distinct facial geometry, e.g. cheekbones and eyebrows. Because Jesus had been so beaten there are precise blood marks of the face on the Sudarium. NASA scientists placed the image of the Sudarium and the shroud over each other and they match perfectly. For most of us the pattern doesn't make sense but scientists can judge the size of the skull, the length of the nose

etc. In one corner there are three dots from the three puncture marks from the crown of thorns. Three species of pollen on the Sudarium match the pollen on the Shroud. The Sudarium contains pollen from Palestine, Africa, and Spain, tracing its journey. The history of the Sudarium is not as well documented as the Shroud. There is pollen from Syria, Turkey, Greece and France on the Shroud showing that it took a completely different route into Europe than the Sudarium. Large numbers of Catholic and non-Catholics come to view the Sudarium when it is displayed and used to bless the people. The Sudarium is a love letter from all eternity. It is as if God reserved this relic until the time when our faith was flagging and when science could help unravel its significance. Its significance would not have been known centuries ago. REGOCIJÉMONOS Y ALEGRÉMONOS

“¡Este es el día en que actuó el Señor: sea nuestra alegría y nuestro gozo!” (Salmo 118:24). Recordemos que estas palabras del salmo responsorial de hoy no sólo brotan del corazón de los que están reunidos en nuestra parroquia. También son cantadas por los pobres en pequeños barrios de toda América Central y Sudamérica. Son cantadas por aquellos a los que se les niega la libertad religiosa en nuestro mundo; estos cristianos elevan sus voces en lugares de culto clandestinos. Son cantadas por personas que han perdido seres queridos a manos del terrorismo y la guerra alrededor del mundo. Incluso en medio del conflicto y la división, los cristianos nos unimos para declarar que la pobreza, la soledad, la violencia y la división nunca jamás tendrán tanto poder como la Vida, la Muerte y la Resurrección de Jesucristo. Sin duda, ¡regocijémonos este día y alegrémonos!

DESDE EL ESCRITORIO DEL PADRE ROA

Domingo de la Resurrección de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo

¡Cristo ha Resucitado! Leamos con atención una de las homilias de Melitón de Sardes, Obispo, sobre la Pascua.

Entendedlo, queridos hermanos: el misterio pascual es algo a la vez nuevo y antiguo, eterno y temporal, corruptible e incorruptible, mortal e inmortal.

Antiguo según la ley, pero nuevo según la Palabra encarnada; temporal en la figura, eterno en la gracia; corruptible en cuanto a la inmolación del cordero, incorruptible en la vida del Señor; mortal por su sepultura bajo tierra, inmortal por su resurrección de entre los muertos.

La ley, en efecto, es antigua, pero la Palabra es nueva; la figura es temporal, la gracia es eterna; el cordero es corruptible, pero incorruptible es el Señor, que fue inmolado como un cordero y resucitó como Dios.

Dice la Escritura: Era como cordero llevado al matadero, y sin embargo no era ningún cordero; era como oveja muda, y sin embargo no era ninguna oveja. La figura ha pasado y ha llegado la realidad: en lugar del cordero está Dios, y en lugar de la oveja está un hombre, y en este hombre está Cristo, que lo abarca todo.

Por tanto, la inmolación del cordero, la celebración de la Pascua y el texto de la ley tenían como objetivo final a Cristo Jesús, pues todo cuanto acontecía en la antigua ley se realizaba en vistas a él, y mucho más en la nueva ley.

La ley, en efecto, se ha convertido en Palabra, y de antigua se ha convertido en nueva (y una y otra han salido de Sión y de Jerusalén); el precepto se ha convertido en gracia, la figura en realidad, el cordero en el Hijo, la oveja en un hombre y este hombre en Dios.

El Señor, siendo Dios, se revistió de naturaleza humana, sufrió por nosotros, que estábamos sujetos al dolor, fue atado por nosotros, que estábamos cautivos, fue condenado por nosotros, que éramos culpables, fue sepultado por nosotros, que estábamos bajo el poder del sepulcro, resucitó de entre los muertos y clamó con voz potente: «¿Quién me condenará? Que se me acerque. Yo he librado a los que estaban condenados, he dado la vida a los que estaban muertos, he resucitado a los que estaban en el sepulcro. ¿Quién pleiteará contra mí? Yo soy Cristo -dice-, el que he destruido la muerte, el que he triunfado del enemigo, el que he pisoteado el infierno, el que he atado al fuerte y he arrebatado al hombre hasta lo más alto de los cielos: yo, que soy el mismo Cristo.

Venid, pues, los hombres de todas las naciones, que os habéis hecho iguales en el pecado, y recibid el perdón de los pecados. Yo soy vuestro perdón, yo la Pascua de salvación, yo el cordero inmolado por vosotros, yo vuestra purificación, yo vuestra vida, yo vuestra resurrección, yo vuestra luz, yo vuestra salvación, yo vuestro rey. Yo soy quien os hago subir hasta lo alto de los cielos, yo soy quien os resucitaré y os mostraré el Padre que está en los cielos, yo soy quien os resucitaré con el poder de mi diestra.»
