MY CATHOLIC FAITH

CANDLEMAS: WHY WE SUFFER

~FROM THE PASTOR~

There are two topics I'd like to focus on today. The first is the Purification of Mary which we read about today in the Gospel of Luke, whereby 40 days after the birth of Jesus, St. Joseph brought our Blessed Mother and Jesus to the temple to fulfill this ancient purification rite and to present Jesus to God. We will read an article that answers questions about this in regard to the old Law and the new Law and the need to fulfill the Old Law and usher in the New. We will also read about why we suffer in this life. Our second reading tells us: Because he himself was tested through what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.. Let's read on ...

FULFILLING THE OLD LAW

~JEWISH LAW & PURIFICATION~

February 2 marks the 40th day from Christmas, and as Saint Luke tells us, Mary and Joseph presented Our Infant Lord at the Temple on the 40th day after his birth. Leviticus 12 states that when an Israelite woman gives birth she becomes ritually unclean: if the child is a boy, she is unclean 7 days after birth and that her uncleanness endures for an additional 33 days due to the flow of her post-partum blood flow. So after 40 days, she presents herself at the Temple to be purified and readmitted to the liturgical life of Israel. If the **child is a girl**, she is unclean 14 days after birth and that her uncleanness endures for an additional 66 days due to the flow of her post-partum blood flow. So after 80 days, she presents herself at the Temple to be purified and readmitted to the liturgical life of Israel. Jesus is male and so the timeline is 40 days. Dec 25 + 40 days = Feb 2.

~THE SACRIFICE~

The woman is to bring a sacrifice to the Temple to dedicate the son or daughter: Ideally, she brings a lamb. However, "if she cannot lay her hand on a lamb fit to be offered, she must bring two turtledoves or two young pigeons, one as a burnt-sacrifice and one by way of amends." Mary, being poor, brought two doves – but in reality she brought THE Lamb of God.

~THEOLOGICAL CONUNDRUMS~

There are two theological conundrums here: 1) Jesus is the Son of God. Why would he need sacrifice offered for Him? 2) How could Jesus, the Pure One, make Mary impure through birth? And isn't Mary immaculate and entirely pure? The answer is found in the Baptism of Christ. Christ submitted to Baptism not because he needed grace or the remission of Original Sin, but because He wanted to unite himself to sinners while at the same time instituting the Sacrament of Baptism. Christ indeed submitted to every law of Moses so as to fulfill the Old Law perfectly (hence, we Christians do not need to submit to the ceremonial and judicial precepts of Moses - like not eating pork). The same is true of Mary - both for the Old Law and the New Law. She submitted to the entire Old Law even though she knew that her Son fulfilled the Law and stood above the Law as God. She beautifully conformed to His pattern and example. Same goes for Joseph.

~FULL OF GRACE~

It is Catholic tradition that Mary was full of grace and that she did not need the sacraments, but that she submitted to the rites and sacraments of the New Law – namely that she was baptized, confirmed, and fervently received the Eucharist – even though all the graces were already present within her. There is a tradition that Christ only baptized two persons by His own hand: Peter and Mary. Peter then baptized the other 11 Apostles and then the 12 Apostles baptized the multitudes. Catholic commentator Cornelius Lapide even speculates that Mary received Extreme Unction from the hand of an Apostle before her Dormition, even though she didn't need it since corruption could not



touch her. Lapide is clear that she would have never gone to confession, however. Confession requires the matter of actual sins committed in order for the form of absolution to be proclaimed. Mary had nothing at all to confess. h t t p s : / / taylormarshall.com/2017/02/

SUFFERING

~AN UNCHANGING FEATURE OF LIFE~

" ... Suffering is like childbirth or sunlight. It is one of the unchanging features of the human condition. It's easy to rediscover God in a moment of crisis ... and lose him again as life regains normalcy. But any piety that depends on circumstances is a house built on sand. Circumstances change, and at death all will change at once by disappearing, leaving each of us with the only two realities we can never escape, to all eternity: ourselves and God. These are the two essential foci of our lives; everything else is circumstance circling around them, like planets orbiting a double star or like the albumen surrounding a double yolk. Though truth is our mind's natural food, sin has made it "natural" (or rather, normal) for us to be so unnatural as to lose our appetite for it. And so we forget or ignore God until a large and sudden crisis looms and then forget him again when it passes.

~WHEN WE FORGET PIETY ... WE SUFFER~

This habit is the opposite of the good habit, or virtue, of piety. Piety moves us to give-first of all to God, then to our parents, ancestors, country, and all in authority over us - the reverence and respect that is due to them. It is a part of justice, and like every virtue, it is an application to a specific area of virtue's most general rule, the rule of the three R's: right response to reality. Our habitual forgetfulness of piety is probably one of the reasons we suffer. It prevents a God who is not only infinitely more good but also infinitely more loving, and not only infinitely more loving but also infinitely more kind and compassionate than we can conceive, from letting us have the settled contentment we crave. We need crises, for we have spiritual sleeping sickness and need frequent alarms. God, therefore, stoops to conquer-stoops to use crude measures like national crises to remind us of our permanent needs and our constant situation.

~AN ABNORMAL STATE ~

In fact, suffering and even crisis is our normal situation. The bubble of pain-free and ordered living that we modern Americans think of as our normal state is highly *ab*normal judged by historical standards. In most cultures throughout human history, people could expect to experience monthly about the same amount of physical pain most of us encounter in a lifetime. Remember, for instance, that anesthetics

and pills were invented only about a century ago. This is probably one of the reasons why people in scientifically advanced cultures tend to be more secular and people in scientifically primitive cultures tend to be more religious: not because religion is based on scientific ignorance or because any scientific discovery has ever disproved a single doctrine of the Christian faith; but because science's child, technology, has conquered or mitigated so many of life's pains and limitations that it has put us into this soundproofed bubble that God has to burst just to get our attention. As C.S. Lewis put it, "God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pain: it is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world" (*The Problem of Pain*).

~SUMMARY~

Here are four important things to remember about 1. Suffering is not a biological necessity. We were not created in a state of suffering. We suffer because we sinned, and we die because we sinned. God did not design us for death but for life, and he did not design us for suffering but for joy: the joy of sanctity, the bliss of self-forgetful love. 2. God has intervened miraculously in our history, and even in our very human nature, our essence. In Christ God added human life to himself so that in Christ man might add divine life to himself. This transforms our sufferings, and especially our death, which is the consummation of all our sufferings and losses. It transforms them into a means of salvation and sanctification and glorification. We may now say of suffering what the old hymn "Open Our Eyes" says of death: "Thou hast made death glorious and triumphant, for through its portals we enter into the presence of the living God." 3. Because Christ entered into our sufferings, suffering is now a way of entering more deeply into Christ. We are never closer to Christ than when we share his cross.

4. This intimacy through suffering, when freely chosen, can bring about something exceedingly strange and wonderful: a deep, strong, and unmistakably authentic joy. To experience even little

sprinkles of the joy of the saints is to praise the depth of the divine mercy in *allowing* us to share this unique and incomparable intimacy with Christ." For full article by Peter Kreeft, go to: https://www.catholic.com/magazine/print-edition/the-problem-of-suffering-reconsidered

Vida de Santa Inés

En este tiempo de materialismo en el que vivimos, sea nuestra Mártir Santa Inés un modelo de castidad para la juventud. Pidámosle al Señor nos conceda la gracia de vivir encendidos en el fuego de su amor como le fue dada la fortaleza a la Mártir Santa Inés quien se mostró siempre fiel a su servicio y vencedora en el tormento. Pídele a Santa Inés que nos ayude a ser puros de pensamiento, palabra y obra.

Fue una joven romana que murió mártir, escribiendo con su sangre el don de la virginidad, en Roma en la segunda mitad del siglo III o a principios del siglo IV. El Papa Dámaso honro su sepulcro con un poema y muchos Padres de la Iglesia a partir de san Ambrosio. Le dedicaron alabanzas. Nació cerca del año 290 en Roma - Italia, pertenecía a la noble familia romana Clodia, recibió muy buena educación cristiana y se consagro a Cristo con voto de virginidad. Era una joven hermosa, rica y pretendida por muchos nobles romanos.

Cuando tenía trece años el hijo del prefecto de Roma, solicito la mano de Inés en matrimonio; pero ella respondió: "Cristo es mi esposo. El me eligió primero y suya seré. Él ha embellecido mi alma con las joyas de la gracia y la virtud. Pertenezco a Aquel a quien sirven los ángeles". El joven al ser rechazado se enojó denunciándola ante su padre que ella era cristiana, este la hace apresar y la amenazan que abdicara de su religión.

Fue llevada al altar de la diosa pagana Minerva, para que ofreciera incienso en su honor. Pero ella levanto sus manos hacia Cristo e hizo la Señal de la Cruz. Los soldados la ataron de pies y manos; peros sus manos eran tan delgadas que las cadenas resbalaron de sus muñecas. Cuando el juez vio que ella no temía a los sufrimientos, fue llevada a un prostíbulo, pero unos ángeles y señales celestes la protegieron, entonces la pusieron en una hoguera que no la quemo, en vista de todo este martirio y viendo que no sucumbía la hizo que le despojaran de sus ropas delante de una multitud pagana, aunque fue expuesta desnuda, sus cabellos le crecían de manera que tapaban su cuerpo. Ella grito: "Cristo guardara a los suyos". Mientras la multitud apartaba los ojos de esta Santa, un joven se atrevió a mirarla con pensamientos pecaminosos. Un rayo lo cegó. Pero Inés lo curo a través de sus plegarias.

Esta santa lucho hasta la muerte en defensa de la Ley de Dios y no se acobardo por las palabras del malvado, estaba afianzada sobre roca firme. Más tarde fue condenada a muerte, y cuando iba a ser degollada, se dice que el verdugo hizo lo posible para asustarla y atraerla con halagos, ella le respondió: Injuria seria para mi Esposo que yo pretendiera agradar a otro, Me entregare solo a aquel que primero me eligió. ¿Qué esperas, verdugo? Perezca este cuerpo que puede ser amado por ojos que detesto. (Fueron las últimas palabras de Santa Inés). La Santa oró y doblego la cerviz ente el verdugo, permaneciendo ella serena, siendo decapitada para el año 304. Sus padres se encargaron de recoger el cadáver y fue llevada al sepulcro paterno, pocos días después su hermana Emerenciana cae martirizada a pedradas por estar rezando junto al sepulcro, en la Vía Nomentana. Permaneció virgen y obtuvo así la gloria del martirio.

Su nombre latino es Agnes, asociado a agnus que significa cordero. El 21 de enero se celebra la Fiesta de Santa Inés patrona de las jóvenes, las novias, las prometidas en matrimonio, de la pureza y de los jardineros. En relación con la Santa surgió la costumbre de los corderos blancos, cuya lana se utiliza para hacer los palios de los arzobispos. Durante la mañana de esta Fiesta se bendicen los corderitos, que ofrecen al Papa para que con su lana sean tejidos los palios destinados a los arzobispos. El palio es un ornamento de lana blanca con seis cruces negras, que se coloca sobre los hombros, tiene dos bandas que caen sobre el pecho y la espalda. Los nuevos arzobispos reciben el palio el 29 de junio, durante la solemnidad de los Santos Pedro y Pablo. La antiquísima ceremonia tiene lugar en la iglesia de Santa Inés, construida por Constantina hija de Constantino hacia el año 345, en honor de tan admirable santa. Es por ello por lo que la liturgia la presenta como modelo de los éxitos que logra alcanzar una persona cuando tiene una gran fe. La fe en Dios y en la eternidad que lleva al heroísmo.
